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The New York Botanical Garden Receives \$100,000 Grant from RBC Blue Water Project to Protect the Bronx River

RBC Commitment will fund Work to Mitigate Stormwater Runoff, Improve Species Habitat, and Increase Public Awareness

Bronx, NY— The New York Botanical Garden announced today that it will receive a \$100,000 Blue Water Project grant from Royal Bank of Canada (RBC) to support a Botanical Garden project that will reduce damage from stormwater runoff, improve habitat for native plant and animal species, and increase public awareness of urban clean water management.

With support from the RBC grant, about 40,000 square feet of land along the Bronx River— New York City's only freshwater river, which flows through the heart of the Garden—will be planted with trees, shrubs, and other plants to reduce erosion and filter stormwater. A stormwater management system will reduce peak storm flows to the Bronx River and cut the amount of sediment that enters the river at that point by up to 80 percent. Educational signage will explain the importance of controlling urban stormwater, protecting waterways, and improving water quality.

The work is part of the Garden's Green Zone project, which will improve pedestrian access at the Garden's East Gate and enhance environmental sustainability. Targeted for completion in March 2017, the project will also include a pathway accessible for visitors with physical disabilities and public restrooms that use composting technology.

"We are deeply grateful to RBC for its support for this important project," said Gregory Long, Chief Executive Officer and The William C. Steere Sr. President of The New York Botanical Garden. "Since the Garden's founding in 1891, we have been dedicated to preserving and protecting the Bronx River, so as we celebrate our 125th Anniversary, it is especially meaningful to receive an RBC Blue Water grant to help us safeguard this precious resource."

RBC, the largest bank in Canada and one of the largest banks in the world by market capitalization, chose the Garden for a Blue Water Project grant from among hundreds of applicants from around the world, based on its commitment to addressing water issues and protecting water in urbanized areas. One of the world's most vital natural resources, water is fundamental to life on our planet, but local water sources are under continual and growing stress from population growth, climate change, and pollution. Today's announcement is part of RBC's annual Blue Water Day, a time for RBC employees around the globe to come together to protect their local water sources through "Makeovers"— clean-ups, plantings, and awareness-raising. In 2015, over 25,000 employees completed 850 Makeovers worldwide.

To do their part for RBC Blue Water Day on June 2, more than 40 RBC Capital Markets employees in New York will be volunteering at The New York Botanical Garden to remove invasive plant species, monitor water quality and maintain the ecosystems of the Bronx River and the 50-acre old-growth Thain Family Forest, through which the river flows.
