Learn to groove to Latin rhythms as **renowned** *salsa* **dancer Tito Sandoval** conducts fun *salsa* lessons on Conservatory Plaza beginning at 6 p.m. Then step over to the Conservatory Lawn at 7 p.m., to put what you've learned into practice or purchase a glass of sangria or Caribbean-inspired fare to enjoy during an hour-long concert.

Only two more opportunities remain to treat yourself to a one-night island getaway right in the Bronx. **Ilu Aye** presents traditional Dominican music on **August 16**. Trained by master musicians from the islands and versed in sacred and popular rhythms such as *bata*, *guiro*, and *rumba* (Cuba); *bomba y plena* (Puerto Rico); and *palos*, *salves*, and *congas* (Dominican Republic), Ilu Aye is dedicated to preserving and promoting the rich cultural legacy of Africa in the Americas and the Caribbean.

The all-female steel drum orchestra **Women in Steel** closes the *Caribbean Nights* concert series on **August 23**. With members hailing from Barbados, Haiti, St. Lucia, and Trinidad, the group's repertoire is a potpourri of calypso, soca, reggae, pop, jazz, and rhythm and blues, and ballads with melodies occasionally spiced up with samba and bossa nova flavors.
