## Holiday Train Show—Saturday, November 18 through Sunday, January 7

The *Holiday Train Show* in The New York Botanical Garden's Victorian-style Conservatory beckons visitors to enter a magical world brimming with history and enchantment. Experience the wonder of large-gauge model trains and trolleys wending their way through spectacular landscapes and past more than 140 replicas of New York landmarks, including the Brooklyn Bridge, Yankee Stadium, Radio City Music Hall, and Statue of Liberty—all created from plant materials such as bark, moss, twigs, berries, and pine cones by designer Paul Busse and his team. The new replicas for this season are the Bedford Park railroad station and five elaborate Manhattan mansions that were built and ultimately torn down between the years 1764 and 1939.

## **Library Exhibition**

## Buried Treasures: The Nature and Art of Bulbs—through Sunday, January 7

Sumptuously illustrated folios, some dating back as far as the 17<sup>th</sup> century, and original artwork from the outstanding holdings of the LuEsther T. Mertz Library are presented in this exhibition located in the William D. Rondina and Giovanni Foroni LoFaro Gallery. Among the superb historical illustrations on display are Basilius Besler's striking and intricately detailed 1713 copperplate engraving of a crown imperial fritillaria and a beautifully hand-colored lithograph of a crinum lily published in 1830-32 from a drawing by Vishnupersaud. The exhibition also includes masterpieces of botanical art by renowned artists such as Georg Dionysius Ehret, Pierre-Joseph Redouté, and Walter Hood Fitch. Engravings (hand-colored, copperplate, and colored stipple) as well as lithographs and watercolors are media showcased.
