Botanical Garden Releases New Season of Classes for Adults

Registration is Open for Nearly 400 Certificate-Level and Recreational Courses in Botanical Art, Gardening, Floral Design, Landscape Design, and More

The New York Botanical Garden has released a new season of nearly 400 daytime, evening, and weekend classes for adults for Fall/Winter 2013–2014. Single-session classes as well as Certificate programs in Gardening, Botanical Art & Illustration, Floral Design, Horticulture, Landscape Design, Horticultural Therapy, and Botany are now available for registration. Short classes and workshops are also available in Crafts, Wellness & Fitness, and Nature Writing & Photography. Courses offer students an in-depth understanding of plants as well as practical ways to integrate them into their daily lives. Diverse course content ranges from soil science for gardeners to plants used in herbal home remedies. Courses are intended for recreational students as well as those seeking expertise from industry professionals in order to build new skills and career paths through the Certificate program.
