## The New York Botanical Garden Plants 500 Trees as Part of MillionTreesNYC Month

## Tree Plantings Scheduled for April 12 and April 25, 2008

April is "MillionTreesNYC" Month, and The New York Botanical Garden is scheduled to plant a total of 500 trees on Saturday, April 12, (New York Cares "Hand on New York" Day) and on Arbor Day, Friday, April 25, 2008. These are in addition to the normally scheduled spring plantings at the Botanical Garden. The trees will be planted in the northern portion of the Botanical Garden's Forest, along both the Main Trail and the Oak Trail, as part of New York City's Parks & Recreation Department and the New York Restoration Project's plan to plant tens of thousands of trees citywide during the month of April.

With volunteers from St. John's University, 250 trees are scheduled to be planted on April 12 at The New York Botanical Garden:

50 Liriodendron tulipifera (tulip)
50 Betula lenta (sweet birch)
50 Quercus rubra (red oak)
50 Quercus velutina (black oak)
50 Acer saccharum (sugar maple)

With volunteers from the Everett Children's Adventure Garden and from Christodora, a non-profit, nonsectarian operating foundation offering environmental education and leadership training to motivated New York City public school students, an additional 250 trees are scheduled to be planted on Arbor Day, April 25 at the Botanical Garden:

10 Amelanchier canadensis (shadbush or serviceberry)

25 Betula populifolia (gray birch)

50 Cornus alternifolia (pagoda dogwood)

50 Cornus florida (flowering dogwood)

30 Fraxinus pennsylvanica (green ash)

40 Platanus occidentalis (sycamore)

50 Quercus palustris (pin oak)

MillionTreesNYC is part of New York City's PlaNYC initiative with the NYC Parks & Recreation Department and the New York Restoration Project. PlaNYC is the most extensive plan to strengthen New York City's urban environment ever undertaken by an American city, designed to create the first environmentally sustainable 21st-century city on Earth.

New York Cares, which meets pressing community needs by organizing New Yorkers into volunteer services, is mobilizing 5,500 volunteers to help give New York City's public spaces their spring cleaning. April 12 is "Hands on New York Day," a day of revitalizing local parks, gardens, playgrounds, community centers, homeless shelters, and schools.

Haupt Conservatory, Everett Children's Adventure Garden, Rock and Native Plant Gardens, and Tram Tour: \$20 for adults, \$18 for seniors and students with ID, \$7 for children ages 2–12, Members and children under 2 are free. (APRIL 8–24 ONLY: \$13 for adults, \$11 for seniors and students with ID, \$5 for children ages 2–12, Members and children under 2 are free.) A *Grounds-Only Pass* is available: \$6 for adults, \$5 for adult grounds and the students with ID, \$1 for children ages 2–12, children under 2 are free.
