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During *...things come to thrive...in the shedding...in the molting...,* NYBG Offers Complementary Programming for All Ages and Continuing Education Classes Inspired by Visual Artist Ebony G. Patterson

A Richly Illustrated Catalog of This Major Site-Specific Exhibition Will Be Published in the Fall by Rizzoli Electa

Bronx, NY—In conjunction with ...*things come to thrive...in the shedding...in the molting...*, a major site-specific exhibition at The New York Botanical Garden (NYBG), complementary programming and classes will offer visitors further opportunities to engage with visual artist Ebony G. Patterson's unique perspective on formal gardens. A richly illustrated catalog, to be published in the fall, will reflect on the concept of gardens as human-made interventions in nature. As the first visual artist ever to embed within the institution for an immersive residency, Patterson worked directly with the Garden's grounds and collections to form a new body of work that includes sculptures, installations, and interventions with living plants. The exhibition is on view Saturday, May 27 through Sunday, September 17, 2023.

Ebony G. Patterson in Conversation with Thelma Golden

Thursday, May 25, 2023; 5:30–6:30 p.m.; Arthur and Janet Ross Lecture Hall Garden Member \$35/Non-Member \$39 To celebrate the opening of *...things come to thrive...in the shedding...in the molting...,* contemporary visual artist Ebony G. Patterson will discuss the exhibition and her work with Thelma Golden, one of the leading curators of art of the African Diaspora. The result of a yearslong engagement with the Botanical Garden, Patterson has created spaces that evoke the natural world while simultaneously using beauty as an invitation to confront larger societal questions about race, gender, class, and violence. Her exhibition will provoke questions about what is traditionally considered beautiful and what is often cast aside as unwelcoming or threatening, seducing viewers into acknowledging darker truths lurking ominously beneath lushly planted surfaces.

- Ebony G. Patterson is an award-winning visual artist who works in a range of media to use beauty as a tool to address global injustices. Her work is held in the collections of major art institutions, including the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, The Studio Museum in Harlem, Whitney Museum of American Art in New York, Pérez Art Museum Miami, and National Gallery of Jamaica. She was recently awarded the 2023 David C. Driskell Prize by the High Museum of Art in Atlanta.
- **Thelma Golden** is Director and Chief Curator of The Studio Museum in Harlem, the world's leading institution devoted to visual art by artists of African descent. Under her leadership, The Studio Museum has gained increased recognition as a global leader in the exhibition of contemporary art, a center for innovative education, and a cultural anchor in the community. She has received numerous awards, fellowships, and honorary doctorates, and currently serves on the Board of Directors for the Barack Obama Foundation and the Los Angeles County Museum of Art.

Everett Children's Adventure Garden

Kids can explore the ideas from Ebony G. Patterson's exhibition through creative activities in the Everett Children's Adventure Garden. Patterson's multidisciplinary work uses unconventional materials to recreate the way we see gardens through collage, sculptures and site-specific installations. Children can create their own mini-tapestry using materials such as fabric, lace, and plant prints that honor Patterson's unique perspective on gardens. They can also learn about birds and their unique adaptations that Patterson references in her work and pot up their own lush pothos plant (*Epipremnum aureum*) that is a living example from Patterson's art.

Imagine the Plant

His work is driven by a desire to create unique pieces and environments through which the participant can experience transformation. Coming in fall 2023, a fully illustrated exhibition catalog published by Rizzoli Electa will include essays by Joanna L.
