NYBG Celebrates Hispanic/Latinx Heritage Month, September 15, through October 15, 2023, with Culinary Samplings, Tours, Interactive Performances, and Digital Offerings Honoring Cultural Traditions and Botanical Heritage

Bronx, NY—The New York Botanical Garden (NYBG) celebrates Hispanic/Latinx Heritage Month Friday, September 15, through Sunday, October 15, 2023, with an array of on-site and digital programs to spotlight the people and plants of this diverse community.

Highlights include savoring plant-based Mexican treats with XOLO Yonkers, exploring the Maize Garden in the Everett Children's Adventure Garden, Spanish-language guided tours of the Enid A. Haupt Conservatory, a journey through the botanical richness of the Caribbean region with NYBG's Plants of the Caribbean Tour, and the interactive performance *iCorre, Abuelita, Run!* by New York City Children's Theater. Discover inspiring books and stories on the shelves of the LuEsther T. Mertz Library and available for perusal and purchase at NYBG Shop. Delve into digital programs like the Bronx Foodways Oral Histories Project, and magnify your knowledge of plants and Hispanic culture with behind-the-scenes stories of adventure and discovery through the work of NYBG scientists and collaborators in Latin America and the Caribbean.

Harvest Corn with XOLO Yonkers

Bronx Foodways Oral Histories Project: Community Gardens

As part of Hispanic/Latinx Heritage Month, learn from the compelling food stories of Bronx community gardeners, many of Latin American and Caribbean heritage, who have been instrumental in creating, caring for, and cultivating community in these critical spaces. These stories are part of the Bronx Foodways Oral Histories Project, launched in 2021 to preserve the food histories and life experiences of longtime community gardeners and urban farmers across the borough. Gardeners from two pillars of their respective neighborhoods: Morris Campus Farm and Friends of Brook Park Community Garden speak about the importance of these gardens and urban farms to the Bronx and the city at large. Get to know some of the people who make these sources of food and community possible.
