Model locomotives and trolleys trundle through a showcase of nearly 200 twinkling, plant-based replicas of famed local architecture, creating a cityscape in miniature. From the warmth of NYBG's landmark glasshouse to the picture-perfect outdoor display, witness by day or night a meticulously crafted world brimming with the lively energy of New York City during the holidays. The exhibition opens on Saturday, November 16, 2024, and runs through Monday, January 20, 2025. Tickets go on sale to the general public starting September 12, 2024, at www.nybg.org.

Whether reliving favorite memories or creating new ones, the *Holiday Train Show* at NYBG invites everyone to discover the joyful spirit of the season. Journey through the exhibition with friends and loved ones after dark and see the show in a charming new light on select evenings during Holiday Train Nights. Marvel at multiple beautifully lit Conservatory scenes, from the cactus-filled desert to the lush rainforest galleries, which offer truly card-worthy holiday photo opportunities at every turn. Holiday Train Nights take place on 16 select evenings—10 of them for adults-only from 7 to 10 p.m. and six of them for all ages from 6 to 9 p.m.

- Adults age 21 and over can enjoy nighttime viewing of the *Holiday Train Show* at Holiday Train Nights, with festive food and curated cocktails available for purchase, on the following dates: Saturday, November 23; Friday, November 29; Saturday, November 30; Saturday, December 7; Friday, December 13; Saturday, December 14; Saturday, December 28; Saturday, January 4; Saturday, January 11; and Saturday, January 18.
- All ages can enjoy Holiday Train Nights with hands-on activities on the following dates: Friday, December 20; Saturday, December 21; Sunday, December 22; Monday, December 23; Thursday, December 26; and Friday, December 27.

The *Holiday Train Show* is renowned for its vignettes of G-scale model trains enlivening botanical replicas of famous New York landmarks in miniature—some no longer around, like the first Yankee Stadium or the original Penn Station—each delightfully re-created from natural materials such as leaves, seeds, twigs, bark, acorns, and cinnamon sticks by the creative team at Applied Imagination in Alexandria, Kentucky. American steam engines, streetcars from the late 1800s, and modern freight and passenger trains travel indoors in the Conservatory’s galleries along overhead trestles, through tunnels, across soaring structures such as the Brooklyn Bridge, and in an enchanting woodland outdoor display over towering mountains with forest animals, winter-interest plants, and fungi on the Conservatory Lawn, providing merriment for young and old alike.

The exhibition includes interpretive signage that explores some of the plants used to create the *Holiday Train Show* replicas. The signage links to exclusive content in the Bloomberg Connects app that tells these plant stories. The *Holiday Train Show* signs draw a connection between the botanical roots of The New York Botanical Garden’s cherished annual exhibition and the NYBG Science program.
