A new miniature masterpiece joins this year’s *Holiday Train Show* lineup: a botanical replica of One Vanderbilt, one of New York City’s newest architectural icons and the home of the world-renowned immersive observatory experience SUMMIT One Vanderbilt. The replica recreates the skyscraper’s elegant, tapered form and the signature elements of SUMMIT using an intricate composition of natural materials, transforming glass-and-steel modernism into a work of botanical art. The model showcases the creativity and engineering expertise behind the landmark tower and its plant-based miniature counterpart.
